

Lecture Title: Nosography in Psychological Disorders

Target Audience: 3rd Year Clinical Psychology Students

1. Introduction and Definition

Nosography (or psychiatric nosology) is the systematic description and classification of diseases. In clinical psychology, it serves as an essential tool to guide the practitioner's work by categorizing mental phenomena into specific classes. The primary goal is to establish a shared language among clinicians and researchers, which is vital for communicating about diagnoses, understanding etiology (causes), and determining treatment efficacy.

2. Historical Evolution

The classification of mental illness has evolved through several stages:

- **Ancient Times:** Hippocrates and his followers classified mental disorders (like mania and melancholia) based on an imbalance in the **four humors**.
- **The Enlightenment (18th Century):** Figures like **William Cullen** coined the term "neurosis," while **Philippe Pinel** (the father of modern psychiatry) introduced "moral treatment" and categorized illnesses based on clinical observation and the organs affected.
- **The 19th and 20th Centuries:** **Emil Kraepelin** revolutionized the field by grouping symptoms into stable categories, notably distinguishing between **dementia praecox** (schizophrenia) and **manic-depressive insanity**. This paved the way for modern systems like the **DSM** and **ICD**.

3. Major Approaches to Nosography

Clinicians use different models to classify disorders:

- **Categorical Approach:** Considers a disorder as either **present or absent**. It is based on the similarity of a case to a "prototype" description.
- **Dimensional Approach:** Views symptoms on a **continuum** from normal to severe. For example, sadness is measured on a scale (like the Hamilton Rating Scale) rather than just being "present" or "not".
- **Hybrid Approach:** A combination of both. It uses categories for broad diagnostic groups (e.g., Major Depressive Disorder) and dimensions to measure **severity** (e.g., mild, moderate, severe). This is currently the most preferred approach in widespread usage.
- **Etiological Approach:** Focuses on the "reason" or cause of the symptoms, whether biological, psychological, or social.

4. Modern Classification Systems

Two main systems dominate the field today:

1. **DSM-5 (Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders):** Published by the APA, it relies heavily on explicit diagnostic criteria.
2. **ICD-11 (International Classification of Diseases):** Published by the WHO, it is used globally for clinical and statistical purposes.

5. Challenges and Limitations

Despite its importance, nosography faces several challenges:

- **Stigmatization:** Diagnostic labels can lead to "labeling" and social stigma.

- **Nosographic Muddle/Blur:** In transcultural contexts, Western diagnostic criteria may not accurately capture symptoms in non-Western populations, leading to **diagnostic delays**.
- **The Role of Psychoanalysis:** While systems like the DSM are descriptive and symptomatic, psychoanalysis is needed to illuminate the **psychic mechanisms** behind clinical signs.
